



THE MYSTERY OF JESUS CHRIST

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Course Description

The course is an introduction to contemporary Catholic Christology. The approach is that of a “christology from below.” That is, after an initial consideration of some fundamental theological concepts that set a framework for our inquiry, we proceed to examine Jesus Christ as an *historical* figure and object of Christian *faith*. The course pivots around Jesus’ proclamation of the “Kingdom of God” and treats his history through his Resurrection and the sending of his Spirit. Finally, briefly, we will go into the development of New Testament Christologies.

Assignment 1

A three-page (or four, if you need it) paper. This paper will be due on October 14th.

On the basis of your own experience, discuss:

The Question Jesus Christ Answers

The meaning of the topic:

Kasper says (p. 41): “The confession that ‘Jesus is the Christ’ is the answer to the question of salvation and redemption.”

Centuries have passed. People have changed. Yet millions of people still believe that Jesus Christ is the answer to the most fundamental question that their lives pose.

How would you phrase that question? To what “ultimate concern(s)” of your does he offer an answer?

Are your concerns peculiar to you? Can they be generalized, i.e. do you think they are widespread concerns? Are there elements in our present situation that incline us to ask the question about Christ in a different way than before?

Assignment 2

An eight-ten page paper. This paper will be due by December 2nd.

Topic: Jesus' Understanding of the Kingdom of God

Using Smith, Kasper, Ratzinger, and your own reflections, discuss the understanding Jesus had of the Kingdom of God as revealed in

1. His words
2. His actions
3. His “program” (aim, goal, hope)
4. How he viewed his death

As a summary discuss the following questions:

1. Was the Kingdom a future or present reality or both?
2. Was it in any way a political/social reality or religious or both?
3. Was it an act of God, an act of man, or both?
4. Was it an event in history, or an awakening to the transcendental (always and everywhere) situation of men and women before God, or both?
5. Would Jesus have said as he died, “Thy Kingdom come,” “Thy Kingdom has come” or both?

(Test Question)

Everyone has his or her own insights into what Jesus meant by the Kingdom of God, but in the readings and discussion we tried to explore the relationship of Jesus' preaching of “The Reign of God” and the central Christian doctrine of the Trinity. Explore the theme: “The doctrine of the Trinity has traditionally been expressed in a static way. Seen dynamically, would the doctrine of the Trinity shed light on what the ‘Reign of God’ turned out to be?”
