OneWorld Magazine

Statement of Problem:

Santa Clara University describes itself as a Jesuit university that offers an education that is distinguished by rigorous inquiry, creative imagination, reflective engagement with society, and a commitment to fashioning a more humane and just world. The aim of a Jesuit education is to help individuals become leaders of competence, conscience, and compassion, specifically to signify the Jesuit motto “Men and Women for Others.”

Currently, there are several avenues for Santa Clara students to become involved in community service, such as the Santa Clara Community Action Program, Santa Clarans for Social Justice, the Pedro Arrupe Center, and multiple immersion experiences. Although there are many chances and opportunities to serve and act on social justice, a relatively small number of the over 4,000 undergraduate students participate in these activities. Because of the lethargy among the student body, students need an informative and encouraging source to promote the service opportunities available and the Jesuit values that Santa Clara University is built upon.

Santa Clara University students, because of their Jesuit education, have a certain obligation to educate themselves about pertinent social justice issues. The student body therefore has a responsibility to create larger and more accessible ways for students to gain knowledge outside the classroom. The creation of student publication, focusing on the social analysis of international humanitarian issues, will not only empower students who work for the publication, but it will also offer students the ability to gain knowledge from their peers and act upon their new awareness.

Methods:

OneWorld magazine is based upon the notion that while we are many in our cultures, religions and struggles, we are one in our common humanity and one in our vision of peace for the future. There is value inherent to every person that transcends national borders and all differences that exist among us. We must first become aware of the issues that are occurring in the world around us; then, with well-reasoned conviction, we must strive in our actions to live out our faith in the service of others.

OneWorld seeks to educate and create awareness among readers. Through social analyses articles written by students at Santa Clara University on diverse cultures and difficult social issues throughout all corners of the world, readers will be able to further their knowledge and their awareness, thus promoting future action and social change toward a better world.

In May, the magazine will be released to the Santa Clara student population. Through publicity, word of mouth and tabling in Benson, students will be made aware of

magazine. They will also be given the opportunity to pick up a copy of the magazine for free, either at the release party or at different campus locations following the release throughout the week and beyond.

Since the creation of the first publication last year, students were interested and passionate to create the magazine again. By publishing it again this year, we hope to continue to work toward eventually creating two issues of *OneWorld* to be released every year, and ensure its sustainability on campus. *OneWorld* will have the power to create change and awareness not only this once, but in many years to come.

Relevance to past and future research or teaching of applicant

In the past, Campus Ministry has annually released a small, black and white pamphlet that includes a collection of students' reflections on experiences related to social justice and human dignity. While the publication has been popular, it has not generally reached beyond those who are already involved in Campus Ministry, nor has it been educational—simply reflective. Because of this, it has not had the ability to have an effect on the general Santa Clara population.

OneWorld's popularity among students has been immense, allowing students to become involved and active in a new form of education and awareness. It has also been something that the administration has exhibited to potential students and alumni as a way of showing our university's dedication to service learning and the power and ability of the student population.

In helping to create this publication, students will be able to empower themselves to empower others. In reading this publication, students from all walks of life will be able to become more aware, more educated, more caring, and more hopeful towards the possibility of working together to create change.

The creation of *OneWorld* again this year is imperative in ensuring its survival on campus. We hope that in years to come the magazine will be institutionalized with an annual budget and positions. We want this magazine to be something that prospective

students can be excited to be a part of. We hope that the establishment of this magazine becomes a headstone for the mission of our University.
