General Information

Student Loans: Law students generally can secure student loan assistance for summer abroad study. Check your home school for details. Santa Clara students contact Elinore Burkhardt, Director of Law Financial Aid, at eburkhardt@scu.edu or via phone at (408) 551-1719.

Each program will provide a tuition, materials, lodging, and meals budget that will permit you to complete the application.

Scholarships: At \$810 per unit for classes, and \$960 per unit for internships, tuition for summer study abroad is about 33% less than the Santa Clara Law tuition for classes taken on campus. This is a form of Ascholarship@ for all students who enroll in summer abroad study.

In addition, international programs have a few direct aid scholarships:

*Gerald Moore Scholarship for Foreign Study: This is a full tuition plus airfare scholarship for study at Seoul (Human Rights Track), Costa Rica, or Geneva/Strasbourg. Applicants submit a memorandum on a hypothetical question in the spring. The two best submissions are selected for a final oral argument before a panel. Winner receives a full scholarship, plus expenses, to the program selected. Runner-up receives a one-unit scholarship (\$810). (Available for Santa Clara Law students only.)

*Mack A. Player Foreign Study Scholarship: \$2,500 to study in either Istanbul or Vienna/Budapest.

*Center for Global Law Scholarships (five total): One unit (\$810) to study in Sydney, Munich, Hong Kong, Shanghai, or Tokyo.

1. Apply for Admission to a Summer Law Study Program: Applicants first submit completed application to the program of their choice, indicating on the application that a scholarship is requested.
2. Complete Scholarship Application: After submitting an application (or simultaneously therewith) students should complete and submit the attached scholarship application.
3. Basis of Awards: 1) financial need; 2) academic performance and potential; and 3) interest in, and commitment to, international and comparative law.
4. Awards will be announced by April 15.
