BOOK PROJECT

Mexico's Other Revolution: Rural Technology, Environmental Change, and Transnational Migration

My first book project explores how changes to the built and natural environments transformed mobility, space, and citizenship in Mexico. I examine how the expansion of rural industrialization/infrastructure and imaginaries of modernity intensified Mexican migrancy while altering landscapes, communities, and belonging. These processes informed racialized, gendered discourses that criminalized and restricted Mexican and Latino/a mobility in the US, ultimately denying both groups substantive citizenship rights while entrenching a culture of migration in Mexico.
