Course Description

This course is designed to acquaint teacher candidates with learning theories, practices, hardware, software applications, and web resources that are useful in integrating technology into the daily practice of K-12 teachers. The course meets the requirements identified in the technology standard for teacher preparation for the State of California. The guiding philosophy for the course is Constructivism. It is instantiated in the design of collaborative, project-based learning activities that capitalize on the full potential of educational technologies. Students will be expected to fully engage in classroom exercises, group projects, small and whole-class discussions on the assigned readings and activities.





5. Curriculum Design Project (50)

Due Date: 12/8



For this project, you will work in grade level, subject matter teams to develop a curriculum design and build on it throughout the quarter (e.g., identify appropriate assessments, develop a rubric, consider "gamifying" the learning activities or including a game or simulation as part of it, define accommodations for one or more categories of students with special needs based on the Universal Design for Learning (UDL)framework.

Utilize strategies from the *Inclusive Learning 365* and *The Teacher's Guide to Tech 2023* textbooks purchased for this course in your project design.

Task: You will work in groups of 4 people to collaborate on a curriculum design and build a Google Slides presentation that addresses all key elements supporting your design: (*see template, resources, examples, and project explanation on our* **Course Google Drive**).

Your design should include:

- A clear and succinct description of the Lesson Design (note: not a lesson or unit plan!).
- Direct connections to a relevant standard (CCSS, NGSS, etc.).
- Articulation of why specific technologies and resources are to be used (by you and especially the students);
- How your group would modify/adapt the lesson/unit to accommodate the needs of all students relying on principles from the Universal Design for Learning (UDL) framework.
- Identify specific steps your group would take to change the instructional modality from in-person to remote synchronous, asynchronous, blended/flipped, concurrent.
- Identify any games, simulations, AR and/or VR resources that would enhance your students' learning, and
- Include an assessment plan (including at least one rubric) that will allow you to determine the degree to which your students met the learning outcomes for the lesson/unit.

Criteria for Success: The Group Curriculum Design Project will be assessed by the rubric located on the <u>Course Google Drive</u> and on Camino. All group members will receive the same grade. Your group will build a Google Slides presentation summarizing your work on this project, using the <u>template provided</u>. The template is deliberately plain, and your group is welcome to make it more visually attractive. Each group will have 5-10 minutes to present their work to the entire class and allow time for questions (and answers!). <u>PLEASE</u> upload your ePortfolio to your <u>Instructor Google Drive Folder</u> as well as Camino.

6. **ePortfolio* (50 pts.)

The ePortfolio is the ***signature assignment** for this course. You will create and present an individual "ePortfolio" document that incorporates at least four or more examples of the work products generated in class—both alone and in group projects, such as Podcasts or digital videos—as well as links to other products (files, websites) that cannot be integrated directly.

The ePortfolio document will be created as a PowerPoint, Keynote, Google Slides Presentation, or website. You have full creative control over the design and content of your ePortfolio document.

ePortfolio Requirements

- Learning experiences that enhance student achievement through meaningful use of technology.
- A variety of media types (text, graphics, audio, video, web) to make student learning visible.
- How to monitor students' ability to communicate, collaborate, create, and think critically through the effective and appropriate use of technology tools.
- How to identify and use in your lesson/unit designs appropriate technology tools and resources, informed by the Universal Design for Learning (UDL) framework, to address the learning needs of all students.
- Multiple examples of your ability to integrate the California Common Core State Standards into your lessons/units.
- The application of the TPACK model (Technological Pedagogical Content Knowledge) to plan your own professional development.

Task: I encourage you to think about the ePortfolio as a project that you can be developing over time as the quarter progresses. Your ePortfolio project should answer this essential question: "How can I use an electronic portfolio to demonstrate my knowledge and skills as designer of learning experiences, both in person and online?"

Your ePortfolio can be seen as your professional educator "21st Century Calling Card." Because you will be creating it using a flexible presentation tool (*PowerPoint, Keynote, Google Slides, PDF*) or as a website, with complete creative freedom in terms of design and "look and feel," it is best to consider the audience for your multimedia ePortfolio beyond this course—a potential employer, or your professional peers.

With that in mind, your ePortfolio should include:

- Your name, program/subject (i.e., "Single Subject: English" or "Desired grade level: 3rd Grade), and SCU email address.
- A Table of Contents linking to every section of your ePortfolio.
- A short self-introduction that gives the viewer a good idea of your personal background and who you are as an educator.
- At least four examples (*to "Meet" expectations; five or more to "Exceed" expectations*) of work products generated in class—either alone or in group projects—as well as links to other products (files, websites) that cannot be integrated directly. For each example included provide:
 - A one-paragraph "lesson overview" with a sketch of the lesson/unit where you are integrating the technology application (*e.g., creating a podcast recording*)
 - A description of each example application or software included (*e.g., concept mapping*) with links that navigate to the web resource associated with the application or software, and what you did with the app in class (*e.g., a screenshot of a completed concept map or Scratch diagram*).
 - Each lesson overview should be linked to a relevant and appropriate California Common Core State Standard (CCSS), and each CCSS identified should include the number, domain, and standard.
- A brief annotation of how the lesson could be adapted using the Universal Design for Learning (UDL) framework to meet the needs of students with special needs or English Language Learners
- A summary of 100-200 words of your Personal Development Plan based on the "Technological Pedagogical Content Knowledge" (TPACK) model.
- A reflection of 100-200 words on your key takeaways from the course.

Although you may be using a presentation tool like PowerPoint, remember that you are not limited to one "slide" per example—this will be a multimedia document that can also be seen as a website. Therefore, appropriate navigation tools are to be included in your document, so that, for example, the viewer can "jump" from the Table of Contents to any section of your ePortfolio and be able to navigate back—or in any direction they choose.
