


- CIEA was created in 2006 at the request of impacted Tribal leadership and Tribal members in order to address the toxic legacy of mercury left over from the California Gold Rush.
- CIEA is the Tribal Engagement Coordinator for the North Coast Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) working with 34 North Coast Tribes, and in the San Francisco Bay working with 5 Tribes and several Tribal organizations in these regions.
- Our mission is to 'protect and restore California Indian Peoples' cultural traditions, ancestral territories, means of subsistence, and environmental health.
- Our core programs are the Mercury Tribal Health, Tribal Self-Advocacy, and our Leadership programs.
- Together these empower California Indian communities to practice subsistence fishing cultures, avoid mercury and PCBs in fish, self-advocate for cleanup of California lands and waterways, and train the future generation to be environmental stewards.

### **Bay Area Integrated Regional Water Management Program**

Regional effort under DWR that issues large-scale implementation grant rounds using Proposition funding:

- Water Supply / Water Quality
- Wastewater / Recycled Water
- Flood Control / Stormwater
- Habitat / Watersheds







# San Francisco Bay Area (SFBA) Disadvantaged Communities and Tribal Involvement

- In 2019, there were five Tribes in the San Francisco Bay Area interested in joining a funding area-wide San Francisco Bay Area Tribal Advisory Committee to Lead this DACTI Program. Starting December 2020 none of whom had been in the same room at once, who agreed to collaborate to the benefit of this program, to ensure that Tribes in the region benefit.
- CIEA plans to support these Tribal Partners technical assistance, workshops and training, developing adequate needs assessments, governance structure guidelines, and any other documents or tools created to benefit the Tribes of the San Francisco Bay Area.

#### **Governance Structure and Needs Assessment**

#### **Governance structure in the Bay Area**

There are decades-long issues with Tribes being unrepresented in decision-making bodies. Providing
designated space for Tribal participation in the Coordinating Committee would ensure that there is
meaningful representation by Tribal leadership to advocate for their membership when projects are being
considered.

#### **Needs Assessment**

 CIEA staff provided the survey using an online digital service, fillable PDF, and paper surveys to Tribal Environmental Directors, Tribal Administration, leadership staff, Tribal Elders and members at large. The Tribes of San Francisco Bay Area agreed upon this style of surveying to better encompass an aggregate result of their Tribal communities.

### **Distrust in Tap Water Quality**

Most common finding

 Reports of poor taste, odors, discoloration, and even skin irritation

 Overwhelming use of bottled water to avoid drinking tap water

 Support for third party effort to investigate tap water quality




## **Tap Water Testing**

- Regional Tap Water Testing Program Goals
  - Increase trust in bay area tap water
  - Generate regional data on tap water quality
  - Increase understanding of tap water quality policy and science
  - Build and strengthen partnerships between communities and their utilities, municipalities and other public stakeholders

#### Facts at a Glance

- Will analyze over 700 samples in ELAP certified labs using industry standards
- Looking at over 100 analytes including metals, VOCs, drycleaning byproducts, disinfection byproducts, radiation, and more
- Comparing against regulatory standards
- Communities and Tribes determined where to test and what panels they wanted to use. Each had a \$15k budget
- Community and Tribal participants have access to their own data
- Itilities and the state Division of Drinking Water are aware of
