





What is a Coop?

A business owned by its workers, producers or both Structured Democratically one worker = one vote

What is the program?

Veggielution Pilot aiming to launch a successful coop thats creates a baseline for our future small business incubator.

Program Goals

- Share Coop, Catering & Promotora Fundamentals with community program participants
- Launch a Successful Coop after 1.5 years of incubation (200k in Revenue)
- Create the baseline for the future Small Business Incubation Program







How will these goals be accomplished?

The program has 3 phases

Phase 1:

3 Month Course

- 12 15 Participants
- Coop, Catering & Promotora Workshops
- Participants make group proposals for **Veggielution Funding**

Phase 2:

Coop Incubation

- Selected group is guided to legally create Coop
- Develop menu, apply for permits, create brand
- Launch coop with public event





The USDA Farmers to Families Food Box Program began in May of 2020 and ended in May of 2021 having distributed more than 173 million food boxes of fresh produce, milk, dairy, cooked meats and seafood worth over \$5 billion to Americans across the country.






Figure 1: Flow chart of Veggielution's farm box model.


USDA Farmers to Families Food Box


