The program or project must fulfill at least one of the following Learning Objectives to be considered for funding. Grant amounts are awarded on a progressive basis such that:

in order to receive up to \$300, the program or project must "Build Awareness"; in order to receive up to \$400 the program or project must "Build Awareness" AND "Provide a Critical Lens"; in order to receive up to \$500 the program or project must "Build Awareness" AND "Provide a Critical Lens" AND "Ignite Action".

1) Build Awareness (funded up to \$300)

This program will expose participants to cultures, histories, and traditions different from the dominant American culture. This program will also break stereotypes that may be associated with that culture.

2) Provide a Critical Lens (funded up to \$400)

This program will help participants gain knowledge about institutional systems of privilege and oppression, and how it plays out in our daily lives or on an individual level.

3) Ignite Action (funded up to \$500)

This program will encourage participants to take action against injustice and help participants build the skills they need to combat oppression.

The Arab Culture Club is sponsoring the film screening of Five Broken Cameras on Monday the 16th of May.

Igwebuike is co-hosting an event with SJP examining the connections between anti-Black racism and oppression in the United States and global anti-Black racism and the oppression and colonization of Palestinians and other minorities in Palestine and Israel.

MEChA is co-hosting an event with SJP recounting the history that both populations have with borders and borderlands, immigration, migration, and examining the similar systems of oppression and capitalism that keep peoples divided by borders colonized and repressed.

Learning Objectives & Grant Request

How will your program will expose participants to cultures, histories, and traditions different from the dominant American culture? This proposal may be funded up to \$200.

We will be discussing anti-Black racism, police brutality, immigration, border-crossing, and the cultures that are formed as a result of those issues. We will also be discussing Palestinian resistance in Palestine as well as the way Palestinians in the United States are targeted by Islamophobia and anti-Arab racism.

How will this program break stereotypes that may be associated with that culture? This proposal may be funded up to \$300.

The film screening in particular, 5 Broken Cameras, is a documentary that examines the struggle of one Palestinian village in the West Bank, Bil'in, to keep hold of its farming land as nearby Israeli settlements expand and fence off sections of that farming land, and the story of the non-violent protests that Bil'in has taken up to garner international solidarity and opposition to the appropriation of their land. A lot of people, especially in the United States, haven't the slightest idea about what the situation on the ground in Israel and Palestine looks like beyond that there is "a conflict", and the film screening - as well as the other events - break away from the mainstream media's portrayal of Palestinian resistance as inherently violent to portray a decade-long resistance by a Palestinian village that continue to be non-violent.

How will this program help participants gain knowledge about institutional systems of privilege and oppression, and/or how it plays out in our daily lives or on an individual level? This proposal may be funded up to \$400.

One of our goals in collaborating with MEChA and Igwe is to examine how oftentimes very similar systems of oppression can oppress different groups at a time. For example, the same multi-national corporations are responsible for border security along the US-Mexico border and border security of the Separation Barrier in the West Bank. We also want participants to examine their own complicity in these oppressions - even though Palestine and Israel are thousands of miles away, American students in particular are very heavily fied to the situation because the United States gives Israel \$30 billion of military aid and assistance every year.

How will this program encourage participants to take action against injustice and/or help participants build the skills they need to combat oppression? This proposal may be funded up to \$500.

Our goal is to move past just awareness to action, so we will have stations set up at the Mock Separation Barrier to help people learn about individual cases they can help fight, such as signing petitions or calling detention centers in the US to free Palestinian political prisoners and detainees. We will also be informing participants of their complicity in the hopes that they can come to understand boycott as a tool of resistance.

I wouldn't necessarily look to turn-out as a measure of success, because it will be during week 8 and because many people could come but not learn anything, necessarily.
